


Seasonal Reading

Please encourage you children to read over the Feburary break - all students can bring a book home with them but there are many more books to explore at you local library:












Introducing some new members of our team....

What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a paid job where the employee learns and gains valuable experiences.

Alongside on-the-job training, apprentices spend at least 20% of their working hours completing classroom-based learning with a college, university or training provider which leads to a nationally recognised qualification.

An apprenticeship includes:

- paid employment with holiday leave
- hands-on-experience in a sector/role of interest
- at least 20% off-the-job training
- formal assessment which leads to a nationally recognised qualification

Year Eleven Bexley College visit



Manga books are a bit different in that they are printed the opposite way from your normal book. So details may seemingly be on the inside of the back cover instead.

And for those that might not be so interested in Romance there were books on topics like how much I love my pet!




Bringing Shakespeare to Life: A Successful Visit from a Practitioner of the Globe


