Our zones of regulation lessons and skillsbuilder sessions help us to prepare students for life in the workplace and every day I am astounded to see the level of kindness and genuine empathy that our students demonstrate towards each other. What a privilege it is to work with these young people.

This year we say a fond farewell to Mr Mansbridge who is leaving to work in a through school. We will miss his input in the various roles he has performed across the school, his dry sense of humour and commitment to providing the best possible support for his team. The students will miss him too. We wish him the best of luck in his new role.

We welcome next academic year three new members of teaching staff, Ms Booth, Ms Sargent and Ms Younis. We also welcome a new SENDCo Ms Leyland and senior teaching assistant Ms Charter. All of them bring a wealth of knowledge of experience from across Primary, Secondary and SEN settings, we look forward to welcoming them into the Cleeve Meadow family.

This year has been a very good year again for school attendance. Cleave Meadow is now competing with the highest attending secondary schools in TKAT and is achieving records well above Special SEND national averages, with CMS attendance at 90.7% versus national SEND schools at 86.2%.

The rate of persistent absence (90%) or below has improved also and is now only 26%, having fallen and improved from 34% earlier in the year. This compares to persistent absence across SEND schools nationally at 39%; we are significantly better.

Thank you for supporting excellent attendance at Cleeve Meadow. Thank you for making as many appointments as you can out of the school day. And thank you for bringing children back to school after local appointments, all of this has made a significant difference.

There are now 51% of students whose attendance is above 95%, the government expectation for all children. But we want this to improve next year and aim for 60%, so please continue in all you do to support attendance and understand that we will always ask and challenge absence to keep these records high and keep children safe in education.

The following amazing young people have attendance that is 95% or better. Well done to you all.

The DofE is a brilliant opportunity for young people to have fun, improve self-esteem and build confidence, while gaining essential skills for work and life such as resilience, problem solving, teamworking and communication. Having a Duke of Edinburgh's Award enhances your CV and college or job applications and employers recognise the Award and the work-ready skills young people have.

As you may remember, we have gradually worked our way through levels one to four in this award with various gardening projects and activities. To achieve Level five our gardening project had to involve the local community, so we are grateful to all our parents, friends and visitors who joined us for our gardening events. Being able to share the events with you made it even more special, helping us to promote the importance of gardening and the environment for us all, and for the students to show how proud they were of all their efforts within school.

Gardening has so many benefits for our own health and well-being and for the planet. As a result of the various gardening projects that have been undertaken, the outside areas around school have been improved for everyone's enjoyment. To achieve this level 5 award, students have learnt how to sow, care for and harvest vegetable and herb plants, learning where our food comes from and using it to cook with. They have weeded flower beds and learned to manage the soil. New sapling trees and shrubs have been planted and we have learned about the benefits these will bring to air quality and pollution. Students considered the wildlife who use our environment, providing new habitats for them and learned how the wildlife helps us too.
